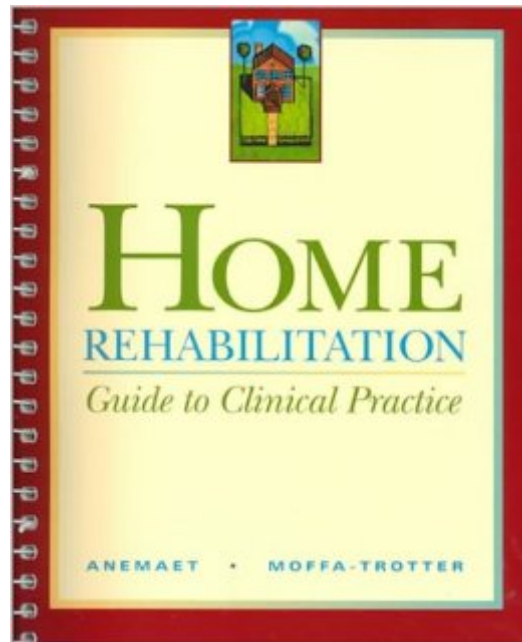

A special section of appendices includes necessary reference information such as ICD-9 CM Common Therapy Diagnoses, listings of community organizations, HIM-11 Coverage of Services and Durable Medical Equipment, and a listing of suggested home care resources. A must have for any home care therapist! Describes over a hundred practical assessment tools and measures. Provides easy-to-retrieve and easy-to-access information in a convenient format. Includes forms and checklists that show the reader the tools needed in a home care environment. Includes documentation guidelines for appropriately filling out paperwork. Provides emergency procedures and protocols that can be accessed quickly in case of an emergency. Contains pharmacology information to give the therapist a quick reference guide to recognize side effects, drug interactions, and proper therapeutic medication level guidelines. Provides ICD-9 CM Common Therapy Diagnoses and HIM-11 Coverage of Services information regarding billing and insurance. Includes multidisciplinary tools helpful to physical therapists, occupational therapists and rehab nurses.

Great for providing information on all types of rehab assessment tools, ethics, and quick emergency assessments and protocols. For a PT preparing to transition into home health, I have found this book helpful in understanding the focus of home health vs. my typical clinical practice. I also liked the section on questions for asking when interviewing for a position. I know this book can't include everything, but I would have appreciated some additional information and suggestions on practical matters such as basic home adaptation, handouts for caregivers (such as transfer training, positioning, etc.) and advice for working through the lengthy initial assessment tool for new patients.

I'm a home health OT, new to home health. This book is a life saver with plenty of information, assessments, and almost everything you would need to know for home health. Granted, it's a little out of date with all of the new medicare guidelines, but most of the information is still very useful. I have no regrets and wish I had bought the book when I first started home health.

I received "Home Rehabilitation: Guide to Clinical Practice" By Anemaet & Moffa-Trotter 2000 and LOVE it!! think it is especially good for those new to home care. It has sections on setting schedules, equipment, infection control, safety, regulations, medications, ethics, and pediatric and adult conditions. There is an extensive listing of evaluations, which are described in usable detail. Common medications are listed by both generic and brand names, making them easy to track
